Because if we allow it, 'family dysfunction and toxic love' can and will destroy the very soul of us. If we underestimate its moral and spiritual impact, it will quietly but surely destroy our chances for salvation through Christ. This Spiritual Memoir isn't about people; it isn't focused on engaging and entertaining through the famous art of storytelling. Its written for those God-fearing souls, who have deep and abiding faith and confidence in the actual 'promises' of God, and that just want out of the lifelong and never-ending cycle and life prison of 'family dysfunction.' It addresses Christian faith in a way that church life and organized religion never addresses or covers. This book is written for deep personal reflection, on the need to fully engage in spiritual washing and cleansing and purification --

even purging and going through the refiner's fire. This book is for the God-fearing soul that has no desire for or interest in the demands and distractions of religion and religious life and religious teachings, but still desperately wants real 'faith' in God and Christ. The author details the very real inner struggle to discard and change old mental and emotional habits 'inherited' from family dysfunction and toxic love, as well as those 'taken on' as an arsenal of defense mechanisms -- that is, to support the never-ending struggle to survive and coexist with them; and to work hard to take on new mental and emotional habits, that are in complete alignment with the commands of God and the teachings of Christ -- for the specific purpose of getting 'spiritually qualified' to receive the promises of God and the promised blessings of the covenant. The core message of this Spiritual Memoir is threefold: 1) that 'Family Is Not Everything'; 2) that 'Love Is Not A Prison'; and 3) that Christ came to invite His own to 'Skip the Religion, and Focus Exclusively on the Faith.' While the goal of this book is to help the reader learn how to spiritually remove layers and layers of 'bad teachings' [not matter how well-intentioned] and 'false teachings' on family and on love and on forgiveness, to return to the basics of the faith -- focusing strictly on learning nothing but the truth of the Gospel. The book provides memorable insights of the sixteenth Karmapa and other teachers of the Kagyu tradition in the 1970s. Sister Palmo's life as an Englishwoman in India was extraordinary both as an academic, political activist, and social worker. She is remembered as one of the key figures in bringing the sixteenth Karmapa to the West. She influenced younger important teachers like Trungpa Rinpoche and Akong Rinpoche. It was my privilege to have been her student, and to study and travel with her. This memoir is a reflection of that extraordinary time of the arrival of Tibetan Buddhism in the West in the 1970s. The memoir brings with it deep, personal experiences from my own life, lived out during the brutal years of the apartheid government in South Africa. The life and work of Sister Palmo continues to inspire others on the path. She brought the ancient yogic tradition of the woman yogis of the past together with insights into contemporary life. Her invaluable teachings open a door into the practice of Buddhism in our everyday journey. The author's original intent in writing this memoir was to reflect on her life and share personal stories of faith with her children and grandchildren. She writes of prayer and of God's often unrecognized availability, presence, and providence. A writer-editor at one Christian Writers Conference examined the

developing manuscript and encouraged her to add questions at the end of each chapter, directing reader reflection and extending the book's usefulness far beyond just family. A contemplative Quaker upbringing created keen awareness of the Holy Spirit and established a mystical foundation for the author's life, helping her understand what it means to be in an active living-loving relationship with God, a channel of divine love such as revealed in the life and teachings of Jesus. Each chapter has its own theme, and the stories are not always in chronological order because some themes recur over a lifetime. The author shares openly the highs and lows of her less-than-perfect life—things not uncommon to humankind but which are seldom subjects of conversation in our fast-paced, secular world. The stories reveal vulnerability and challenges to faith as well as affirmations. Poems and prayers, written at or near the time of the unfolding stories, plumb the depths of the author's experience. Questions at the end of each chapter are similar to those a spiritual director might ask to invite consideration of one's own spiritual journey—where faith has strengthened them, where it has faltered, or where it has invited new growth.

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
